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


### What's the difference between a Directing II, III and Independent projects?

What If I only have one monologue? There is a very good possibility that an audition notice will be for more than one show at a time, and require more than one monologue. Best thing to do-have two prepared, obviously. But sometimes an audition can sneak up on

Now-you can do it the way
we all studied for finals in high
school- find a monologue
and pull an all-nighter to
read the play, memorize the
monologue, form a
character and just make it to
your first class; OR you can
talk to the director(s) and
simply present the second
monologue at the audition

with the script in your hand (having read it over out loud several times before auditioning with it.)

What if the show
requires an accent? Just
because the show might be
English or Irish or somethingdon't freak out about an
accent. Just ask the director if
he or she wants accents to be
used at generals (generals are
the first round of auditions). As
far as contacting the directing
students - just write your
questions down on a piece of
paper and put it in the

directing class's mailbox in the third floor office. To contact mainstage directors, leave notes for them in their mailboxes or in the show's boxall located in the third floor office.

When it comes to making an appointment for an audition- the sign-up sheets are on a table outside of the third floor office. Now here is another important thing. If someone has already signed up for the only time you can audition-don't scratch his or her name out. Simply go talk to the person and ask if they can switch a time with you. If you are really in a jam about the audition times-leave a note for the director, and they will usually find time to see you.

Finally we come to the ugly topic of blacklisting. If you sign up for an audition time, do not cancel, and fail to show up for the audition, you can be blacklisted. That means that you are not allowed to audition for ANY shows for an entire year. So when you sign up for the audition-double check your schedule, and if an

emergency does come upfind a phone and call the theater office (312) 344-6000.

The great thing about Columbia is that there is always stuff to audition for. Even if someone strikes out with theater one semester-there are always student films looking for actors.

Student films are also GREAT experience!

And when it comes to auditioning- don't be afraid to try out new monologues. If actors use new monologues every time they audition for something- they will have great collections of classical, contemporary, comedic and dramatic monologues to choose from for outside auditions. But the best advice anyone can and will give you in this department is to audition, audition, audition.


