bia's Mrs. Mattie Allen. Graduated from CC in 1908. the former Mattie Russell was re-enrolled as a regular student in the TV department of the College's Los Angeles Division during the summer term of 1954 and she'll be back in the summer of '55 if attending classes can be fitted into her rigorous schedule.

According to a feature story in the Los Angeles Examiner, "When Hollywood began to steal pre-eminence from New York's Broadway in the TV field, the Chicago College opened a division in L.A. So Mrs. Allen, who became a Southern California resident many years ago, didn't have so far to go to re-matriculate with her alma mater.

Mrs. Allen, whose standout career as a teacher of speech and dramatics spans almost half a century, said, "the first time I went to Columbia in Chicago, I got the money for tuition by selling the calves I raised on my father's farm in Missouri."

In 1911 Mattie Allen was Dean of Girls at Long Beach (California) High School in addition to her teaching assignments She was head of the Speech and Drama departments at high schools in Fullerton, and Pomona, Calif. At these schools Mrs Allen's classes consistently copped the top places in statewide drama competition.

Since retiring as a teacher, Mrs. Allenhas been associated with the Long Beach Community Players. She has played top roles in such productions as "Spring Again," "Claudia," and "The Women." Her most recent appearance was in "January Thaw," which has just finished a long run.

DICK SUTTER UP AS OWNER, GENERAL MGR. WRMN
