COLLECTION SUMMARY

William A. Brown (1938-2004) was a founding member of the Center for Black Music Repertory Ensemble and a Distinguished Professor of Voice at the University of North Florida. He was a tenor and a recitalist who performed with leading orchestras and operatic companies throughout the world.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

William A. Brown was born on May 29, 1938 in Jackson, Mississippi to Albert Brown and Ida Mae Perry. Brown began singing in his local church choir at an early age. In 1949, he pursued the trumpet and piano thus beginning his musical training. His success as a trumpeter at Jim Hill High School afforded him the opportunity to attend Jackson State College on a full scholarship in 1955. After performing in his first opera "Cavalleria Rusticana" at Jackson State he changed his concentration to voice. Brown graduated in 1959 with a B.M.E. In the fall of the same year he taught for one year as a voice teacher and director of the choir at Utica Junior College in Utica, Mississippi. He then went on to enroll at Indiana University-Bloomington in 1960 for voice. Brown received a M.M. in 1962 and enlisted in the United States Navy. He served as a chief petty officer and chorister for the US Navy Band "Sea Chanters".

While Brown was in the Navy he married Marion Tally. He was discharged in 1966 and began his career. In 1968, Brown debuted with the New York City Opera in Weisgall's Nine Rivers from Jordan. His contribution to black music came in 1970 when Brown gave recitals nationwide entitled "Black Composer Concert", which highlighted only black composers. Brown became Associate Professor of Music at the University of North Florida in Jacksonville, FL in 1972. Until late 2002, his concert career consisted of performances with the Boston, Cincinnati, Baltimore, Royal Philharmonic, Detroit and Cape Town symphonies; New York City, Lake George Opera Festival, Opera Ebony, and Goldovsky opera companies; Don Ottavio in Don Giovanni, Tamino in Die Zauberflöte, Count Almaviva in II Barbiere di Siviglia. Brown died on October 20, 2004 in Jacksonville, FL.

SCOPE & CONTENT/COLLECTION DESCRIPTION

His papers, from 1947, 1955-2003, include concert programs, promotional materials, photographs, correspondence, and media concerning his career as an operatic tenor and recitalist.
