CROSS OFF YOUR NAME on the particular audition sign-up sheet if you choose not to audition. If you do not show up for your audition and your name has not been crossed off, you will be blacklisted (not able

Mission Statement: Black Actors Guild is a multi-cultural organization dedicated to the preservation and uplift of Afro-American Theater as it pertains to Columbia College's campus and to the community. Black Actors Guild also thrives to serve African-American theater students with the essentials to build careers as professional and hopes to provide a sense of community among peers.

Along with presenting works of African American artists, the Black Actors Guild (otherwise known as BAG), often partakes in community activities. The Black Actors Guild holds weekly meetings open to EVERYONE. The meetings' subject matter differs from week to week. There may be a discussion about a play, a guest speaker, or conversation on upcoming events. Some past events have included monthly monologue nights, a hot chocolate and Krispy Kreme donut fundraiser, and a Harlem Renaissance Night.

Musical Theater Collective

Mission Statement: The Columbia Musical Theater Collective is organized to coordinate the most diverse of interests and talents Columbia has to offer. The Theater Department at Columbia is one of the largest departments in the school and the Musical Theater Performance Major is one of the most exciting majors offered. That excitement is manifested by the diverse, eclectic student body that is the core of support for Musical Theater at Columbia. Our performances will involve the Musical Theater majors and lovers alike from the entire campus. Columbia Musical Theater Collective's coordination of interactive faculty and various Columbia majors such as Film, Writing, Music, and other studies of theater affirm our group as an interdepartmental phenomenon that unites Columbia College students and rallies school morale.

Essentially, the collective has formed in order to present more opportunities for Columbia's musical theater students to perform and put into practice what they have learned through the Music Theater department, and to make contacts and resources available to the department from the city. Fall of 2004 the collective performed "I Wish I Were in Love Again", a musical revue written and produced by students Eric Martin and Harmony France, directed by faculty member Scott Olson, and music directed by Rose Colella. The cast performed solos, duets and ensemble numbers amidst a nightclub atmosphere in the Classic Studio. In the Spring/Summer of 2005 the collective formed a relationship with Broadway in Chicago to bring discounted tickets to our students for shows such as "Wicked" and "Little Shop of Horors". Then, in the Fall of 2005 the collective brought us a staged reading of "Into the Woods", again produced by students Eric Martin and Harmony France, directed by Columbia College Alumnus Brendan Balfe, and music directed by Andra Velis Simon (Managing Director of the Neo-Futurarium) with a cast of 13, involving students that ranged from freshmen to seniors.

The collective has been successful in its goals to bring more performance opportunities to music theater students and has made contacts and relationships from within the city to help broaden our school's resources. However, the current board of directors is graduating, and we need outgoing caring individuals to take over.

*BA in THEATER (120 credit hrs.)

*BA in MUSICAL THEATER (120 credit hrs.)

*BA in DESIGN & TECHNICAL THEATER (120 credit hrs.)

*Interdisciplinary BA in PLAYWRITING, FICTION WRITING and THEATER (120 credit hrs.)

The Bachelors of Arts degrees provide a general education in the practice of theater. The BA is designed to provide a basic understanding of theater technique and theory, while also providing advanced classes in the area of the student's interest. The BA also allows room in the schedule to complete a minor in another area, or to take other classes of interest and provides a solid base for pursuing a career in the theater and/or for seeking a graduate degree in theater or other disciplines. Students working towards the BA in Theater, Musical Theater and Design are eligible to participate in Senior Showcase.

The Bachelors of Fine Arts degrees are designed to provide an in-depth education in specific theatrical disciplines. Each curriculum has been designed to meet current standards set by the National Association of Schools of Theater (NAST). These standards are expected of students who are interested in pursuing a career in the theater as an actor, director or designer and/ or in continuing with graduate study. Completing a BFA degree leaves little room outside the requirements to take electives and completing a minor is highly unlikely. BFA students will be required to maintain a portfolio that documents their growth; these portfolios will also be periodically assessed by faculty. Meeting or exceeding standards will be required to maintain BFA status. BFA acting, directing and design students will take part in Senior Showcase.

HERE'S HOW! (oh, this is so exciting!)

- You pay the \$5.00 deposit. (If you plan on checking out books on a regular basis, we will keep it
 for the semester/year, and return it to you at the end. Or you can get it back when you no longer
 need to check out books.)
- Your information is entered into the computer and you can check out <u>PLAYS ONLY</u> (two at a time).
- The check out time is TWO DAYS. You will be told the date the books are due back at checkout time.
- There is a \$0.10 fine for every day the book(s) are late. You can either pay it immediately or have it taken out of your deposit.

It is YOUR responsibility to make sure you get your money back. If you do not claim your money by the end of the year, consider yourself a patron contributor to the Resource Center, as we will use all leftover money to buy new books.

Senior Showcase is an opportunity for graduating seniors (actors, directors and designers) to perform and showcase their work for an audience of Chicagoland production managers, directors, artistic directors, casting directors and agents. Graduates of the undergraduate program in performance present scenes and songs from the contemporary repertoire and those in design display their work in the lobby on Senior Showcase night in late May.

Senior Showcase is an excellent way for graduating seniors to bridge their theater work from Columbia to the Chicago theater community. The

theater professionals who attend Senior Showcase also receive a packet of the showcase participant's headshots and/or resumes.

In order to participate in Senior Showcase, students must complete showcase required courses and 0455 showcase interview/auditions.
