FOREWORD

Our Golden Jubilee

It is fitting that a few words calling back the past and looking into the future be written in this, the Fiftieth Anniversary Program.

Phi Sigma was started in early April, 1878, as a literary and debating class. Our current anniversary program emphasizes the study of literature exclusively for the first time in many years, if not in the history of the club. Perhaps some future year will see the return of the debate.

Six young men, or boys, were the founders. No ladies, husbands or old bachelors were eligible to membership. Gradually the bars to membership were lowered, shall we say, to eight men, then twelve men, twelve ladies, married couples, finally fifty members.

At one meeting in the second year a motion was defeated to disband because of lack of seriousness on the part of the members. The archives report that the admission of the fair sex to membership saved "The Unnamed Class," as it was then called.

The sensitive consciences of these early members may be illustrated by the case of the young man who sent in a letter of resignation while on his honeymoon because the club did not, up till then, provide for married members on its roll. Needless to say, the rules were amended and the benedict, with his bride, permitted to remain as members.

The last business meeting of Phi Sigma instructed your officers to make some summary, if possible, of

the programs during the life of the organization. This we found an impossible task because of the extreme variety of subjects within a given year's program. Only within the last few years has any attempt been made to carry on a single theme throughout the year.

In 1889-90, to take a typical example of the programs of the first quarter century, a meeting was held every month, including July and August. Six of the twelve programs, every other month, were editions of The Voice. (By the way, The Voice is also celebrating its Fiftieth Anniversary at our banquet—April, 1928.) The other subjects were:

May, 1889—Philosophy—Cynics, Epicureans and Stoics.

July-Literature. Journalism.

September—History. Invasion of the Crimea.

November—Analogy between Music and Poetry. January, 1890—Politics. The Present Political

Status of Europe.

March (and this is the gem of them all)—Art:
The Pre-Raphaelite. Brotherhood and
Standard of Pictorial Art. Conception,
Composition, Color, Correctness.

An exhaustive study of the records has been made, and we hope and believe a reliable list of all erstwhile members of this club has been compiled. Many a famous name is found upon this roll.

Your executive committee has attempted not only to develop an interesting program worthy of this special anniversary, but to secure a general participation by the present membership of Phi Sigma.

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1—This Society shall be known as Phi Sigma.

ARTICLE 2—The officers shall consist of a President, two Vice-Presidents, a Secretary who shall also act as Treasurer, and an Executive Committee.

ARTICLE 3—The Executive Committee shall consist of the President, the Vice-Presidents, Secretary-Treasurer, and two others, who shall be elected by the Society. No officer may succeed himself.

ARTICLE 4—The duties of the President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer shall be such as

usually devolve upon such officers.

ARTICLE 5—It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to prepare the annual program of the Society and publish the Year Book. This shall be done as soon as practicable after the Annual Meeting for the ensuing year. The Executive Committee shall also attend to such other matters as may be referred to it by the Society.

ARTICLE 6—Any person may be proposed for membership at any regular meeting, except the annual guest meeting. Such proposal shall be referred to the Executive Committee, whose recommendation shall precede an election. The election of members shall be by ballot, three negative votes rejecting.

ARTICLE 7-Fifteen members shall constitute a quo-

rum to transact business.

ARTICLE 8—Amendments to the Constitution and By-laws may be proposed at any meeting of the Society. Such proposed amendments shall be submitted in writing in open meeting and then be referred to the Executive Committee, which shall report at the next regular meeting on the advisability of

such changes. The amendments shall then be voted on by ballot, a two-thirds vote of all members present

being necessary for adoption.

ARTICLE 9—There may be a list of members known as Honorary Members, whose election shall be by ballot and shall require a unanimous vote of all members present at any regular meeting. No dues shall be required of such Honorary Members and they shall not have a vote in the Society.

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE 1—Phi Sigma shall hold meetings monthly from October to May, inclusive, the December meeting being optional with the Executive Committee. The meetings shall be held the third Thursday of the month, subject to temporary change by the Executive Committee. Extra meetings may be called by the President or Executive Committee.

ARTICLE 2-Meetings of the Society shall commence

promptly at 8:00 p. m.

ARTICLE 3—The annual election of officers shall be

held at the April meeting.

ARTICLE 4—The annual dues of the Society shall be \$2.00 per member, payable in advance at the

October meeting.

ARTICLE 5—At the March meeting the President shall appoint a Nominating Committee of three members, none of whom shall be officers, to prepare a ticket of candidates for the offices of the Society. Said Committee shall present its report at the annual meeting in April. Other nominations may be made at the annual meeting. All elections of officers shall be by ballot.

ARTICLE 6-The active membership of the Society

shall be limited to fifty.
