PHI SIGMA

Founded in 1878

The Society of Phi Sigma is believed to be the oldest continuing group of its kind in Illinois. Its founders, young men who had been members of a high school debating society, wished to promote serious discussion of the national and world scene and related aspects of the socialethical disciplines, and thus to reflect and satisfy the interests and concerns of alert minds striving for enlightenment through study and discourse.

The Greek letters Phi and Sigma are the initial letters of the ancient admonition, "Love Thou Wisdom."

Phi Sigma continues today very much in accordance with its long traditions. Membership is limited to fifty persons, who gather together in each other's homes, where the presentation of papers serves as a basis for spirited questioning and interpretive comment.

Meetings are held once a month, on the second Friday, from October through April (except December), the last being the occasion for a festive party.
