Commuter woes over CTA cuts continue into the New Year

A reality as harsh as the Windy City's winter weather is about to set in for Chicagoans who rely on public transit for their daily lives. From the first moment the Chicago Transit Authority brought forth the proposed fare hikes, service cuts, and layoffs, Chicago area commuters have been on the edge of their seats, fearing the worst.

The proposed plan for the fare hikes was initially scheduled to go into effect Sept 16, 2007, but at the very last minute lawmakers stepped in, postponing the plan until November 4. Advertisements appeared on every bus, el-train, or anything that would be affected by proposed plans showcasing how fed up lawmakers as well as the CTA board were with constantly patching up the situation, using band-aids to depict how a permanent solution had yet to be made.

On Nov. 2, 2007, two days prior to another alleged Doomsday, a \$27 million state bailout of mass transit saved commuters from experiencing the worst. Several public hearings were

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held at area high schools and CTA headquarters between October 30 and November 5th. According to the CTA website, "The Chicago Transit Authority Board desires public comment before it considers an ordinance to adopt the 2008 Operating Budget and Program, the 2008 Capital Program of Projects, and the Financial Plan for 2009 and 2010." Public hearings allow the general public to come out and express how they feel as well as become informed about proposed plans. Chicago area commuters and those who feel a deep concern with the current state of Chicago Transit come out and express how much the



service cuts and fare hikes affect them. During the final public hearing November 5, Jerry Gross, a retired CTA bus driver stated, "I have been to many public hearings, and I am wishing that it could stop." He goes on to say, "...eliminating service is non-productive and even if funding comes, service is an abomination. Bring back paper transfers." Many physically disabled citizens expressed clearly how they felt about the elimination of the Paratransit services on which they heavily rely. High school students also came out to express how the fare hikes

rely. High school students also came out to express how the fare hikes, and particularly service cuts, could affect their everyday commute to and from school as well as work. Ieisha Burrows, a 17-year-old senior at Prosser Career Academy stated that the elimination of the X80 Irving Park Express would intervene drastically with her commute from work, school, and back home again.

CTA President Ron Huberman states that he anticipates that the recent bailout "would be the last of the Band-Aids." Governor Rod Blagojevich states in regards to the \$27 million bailout that "This is not a loan, this is not an advance, this is a direct authorization of funds to the CTA and RTA so that services won't be cut, so that fares won't be increased, and so that the men and women who work at the CTA and RTA won't be laid off."

Stabbing Incident Over Woman Adult charged in minor's case

In 1977, Fred Rodgers allegedly fled the scene of south suburban Homewood after Kenny Hellstrom collapsed with a stab wound in his mother's arms after his shift at a near by gas station.

After that Rodgers is reportedly said to have gone in and out of jail for the next three decades while police struggled to solve this case. During this time it is reported that Rodgers gained a history of drug and alcohol abuse. After all this time, Rodgers' travels brought him back here where he was arrested, also where he reportedly confessed to the murder of Hellstrom.

In March, when Rodgers was arrested, he confessed to killing Hellstrom because of unwanted sexual advances and taunting. In addition the two men at one point shared a girlfriend.

After confessing, Rodgers' lawyers worked to get him charged as a minor because when the crime occurred he was, but Judge Paul Stralka wanted him to be moved to adult court.

Rodgers' lawyers argued that in 1977 he would not have been transferred. But Judge Stralka ordered that Rodgers be transferred because of his drug and alcohol history.

Since juvenile court doesn't handle getting substance abuse treatment, Judge Stralka says that Rodgers needs help and is a threat to himself and the community, so he should be where he could get the care he needs.

Daniel Morales, 26, and Dennis Almodovar, 24, both of Brooklyn, NY, were arrested for robbing the Church of St. Mel in Queens, NY. They had stolen more than \$20,000 on Christmas Day in 2006. According to Father Turczany, the pastor, he was preparing for mass when he saw a man wandering near a staircase. He asked the man what was he doing and he replied that he was looking for a bathroom. He redirected him although he felt suspicious.

Soon a witness saw two men caring a two-foot metal cube from the church to a Lincoln Navigator. Morales reported his Lincoln Navigator stolen shortly after the robbery, according to the New York Times.

Morales was arrested in his home in one of Brooklyn's nicer neighborhoods. He was arraigned and held on \$50,000 bail. Both men were charged with third-degree burglary and could be jailed for up to seven years if convicted.

Before taking his own life, 18-year-old Pekka-Eric Auvinen shot and killed seven students and the school principal. This tragic event is expected to encourage Finland's government to address stricter gun control laws.

Heard and his cousin were in the drive-thru around 4 a.m. when a man approached their car trying to sell drugs. They declined and the drug dealer then went to the car of a young lady and grabbed her

through the window. Heard saw what was going on and tried to help her. He was shot five times. The gunman escaped.

Heard was the father of one-year old twins. He had just been promoted to assistant bank manager and was about to get his business degree in December, according to CBS news.

On October 15th, Rashad Johnson, 18, was charged with firstdegree murder for handling the gun that killed Heard. He is being held on \$500,000 bail. Police say he was not the shooter and are reviewing video from the restaurant and nearby police cameras for new leads.

"Ronald was mighty young man, he was a young man who had some DNA of protecting and serving those that were helpless," said James Whitesell Jr, Heard's pastor.

Heard was the son, godson and nephew of Chicago Police officers, according to Chicagotribune.com.

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Why are you running for State Representative?

Mr. Jackson is doing and has

done many things for his community and others. He is a small man with a big resume! "I have been chief of staff for Chicago Public Schools, chief of education for the City of Chicago, executive officer for the Chicago Housing Authority and assistant budget director for the City of Chicago. I also am, tenure as CEO of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Chicago, founding board member for Hales Franciscan High School, former president of The GAP Community Organization. Jackson appears to be an outcast; "I am running as an independent democrat. If you want to find out who controls whom, find out who endorses them."

What do you think will slow down killing and eventually eliminate it?

'When talking about stopping kids from killing, simply educating does not eliminate it. Rebuilding the family in its proper form and fashion will help in putting value and morals back into their lives."

Are there any last thoughts that you would like to give our youth before we close?

Phillip Jackson's hopeful words to the youth who read this are, "I would like to apologize to the youth today for giving them a world like this to live in. I am very disappointed in the war that is going on all over the world. I am disappointed with the healthcare and housing, with the relationships among races in this country. You should not have to live in a world like this... I want you to know that this is your world. Protect it. Build it. And then get off the planet."

However, the after-school programs Mr. Pope and LaNisa managed were not the only ones cut from the school. "Four agencies were turned down last year. And this year seven agencies were turned down as well," explained Dr. Atria. Yet, unlike most of those agencies, Mr. Pope's and LaNisa's after school programs have been at Sullivan longer and "as a community we thought we had a partnership..." complained Mr. Pope. But evidently, a partnership never existed.

Teens involved in these car accidents, are inexperienced behind the wheel or could have been distracted while driving.

In order to prevent teen car accidents, teenagers should spend more time in the driver's education program and more time practicing with a certified driver on the road. This extra time will allow for the inexperienced driver to get comfortable behind the wheel in many different driving situations and acquire further knowledge of the Rules of the Road.

"Whenever most teenagers are behind the wheel, they are more preoccupied with text messaging, eating or another distraction, instead of fully paying attention to the road," said Stephanie Cortez, a senior at Bogan High School.

As a teen driving, I myself have come close to a car accident because I was distracted by my cell phone while driving. I wondered what would have happen if I had crashed and who could have been injured or possibly killed. After that incident, I learned to pay full attention while driving.

Teens need to become aware of the dangers and distractions all around them on the road. This will help lead to fewer teen accidents and deaths. IO features

Empathy in the court The Feminist Club U of C Laboratory High Schools Mayadet Patitucci

Empathy: the ability to step outside of yourself and into another's situation; to take on their shoes and eyes. When the Feminist Club from the University of Chicago Laboratory High Schools first met to discuss the new Parental Notification Law recently raised by Attorney General Lisa Madigan, we agreed that empathy was the primary force lacking in the federal court. The law was first passed in 1995, but not proposed for full implementation until now. It would require a young woman to notify her parent or guardian 48 hours before obtaining an abortion. Many of us in the club are minors, so this law strikes close to home. It takes a fundamental and deeply personal decision, once again, out of a woman's hands.

This law is unnecessary and formed on the false assumption that all families work the same way. Over half of the young women who do not involve a parent in making this decision cite fear of abuse or eviction as their main reason for not doing so. Although the law would allow a judicial bypass overruling parental rejection, how many women who have been raped or abused by their parents would be willing to stand up in front of a courtroom of strangers and admit to wanting an abortion? If she would be willing, are we the type of society that would then force her to do so?


This law seems especially unnecessary considering that statistically, most young people already talk to a parent or trusted adult while deciding. 74% of 15 year-old women report that at least one of their parents knew of their decision and with 14 year-olds, this percentage increases to 90%. After all, a young woman doesn't have to go before a court to make the decision to have sex in the first place, why should she be kept from making the follow-up choice with the consequences? This is an example of why comprehensive sex education is so important in schools, in order to stop minors from having to make this difficult decision in the first place.

Several months ago, a few members of our club attended a speak-out on the Parental Notification Law sponsored by the Illinois Caucus for Adolescent Health. Youth on both sides of the issue shared their own personal life stories in which they had and didn't have children. Some said their parents were instrumental in helping them make their decision. Others said that if their parents had known, they would have stopped them from carrying through with their plans.

We spoke to one girl who chose to remain anonymous. She has a baby, but said she had considered having an abortion. She said that at the time when she was making this choice, her best friend committed suicide rather than admit to anyone that she had been raped and had become pregnant. We asked this girl "What is the one thing that would have helped you in making your decision?"

She replied, "If my friend had been there."

In the end, trust cannot be mandated, and each of us—no matter our age—deserves the right and respect to decide individually, what is best for ourselves.–

"Seniors are confused," said Freddy Estrada, an admissions representative for the University of Illinois at Chicago on Monday, November 5. "It's a very complex question," he replied when asked about UIC requirements for admission.

"UIC looks at two major things, GPA and ACT." Requirements work on a balancing scale: if your GPA is low, your ACT score has to compensate for its lack and vice versa. This means if a student has a GPA of 2.9, which is considered low, then their ACT score must be in the range of 20 and above to balance out their academic standing. UIC also looks at the courses a student has taken over the years of high school. Freddy also mentioned that the biggest mistake a senior could make is taking all of what are considered "easy courses."

UIC also requires letters of recommendation that are "academically related." The application deadline for 2008 is January 15. Percentage of admission is different each year. In addition, UIC offers many different scholarships including financial aids, loans, grants, and many general scholarships. All you need to do is research for it and ask questions. "There is money out there; go get it!"

"It's a fashion that started in prison." (Verrinder, Matthew. Pull 'em up: Cities started saggy pants crackdowns. Chicago Sun-Times). An Indianapolis judge dismissed a case of school uniforms. The defendants and jury say that the dismissal is a violation of the state's guarantees. The guarantee justifies a free education and the students' rights to free expression. Some parents took this case to a district court and the case was closed because it did not deal with state laws.

Did You Wash Your Hands?

The hospital is supposed to be free of anything that could contaminate any of the instruments used on patients. There's really no excuse for dirty hands, but in many hospitals, that doesn't seem to be the case. MRSA, or the "superbug", is being spread in hospitals across America. Patients are getting the "superbug" and many other infections because medical personnel, even doctors, are not washing their hands.

When someone becomes a doctor, they are taking the responsibility upon

themselves to keep patients healthy. If medical personnel are not washing their hands in an environment where everything's supposed to be germ-free, they're not keeping up with that responsibility. A health care worker's hands can have up to 4.6 million types of bacteria. With numbers like this, especially in a hospital, it is very important that the doctors, nurses, and any other staff member there wash their hands. Hospital staff should wash their hands before and after coming into contact with a patient. According to the Center for Disease Control, studies show that they're only washing their hands about half the

time.

Some hospitals are providing incentives for their workers to remember to wash their hands. In 1847, a researcher demonstrated the necessity of clean hands. Women in a Vienna hospital were dying at an alarming rate because doctors were delivering babies immediately after performing autopsies. After doctors began decontaminating their hands with a chlorine solution, the death rate declined dramatically.

Studies have shown why people who work at hospitals fail to comply with hand hygiene. Some of the soaps used my cause irritation and dryness in the hands of the user. Some staff believe they are too busy to wash their hands. Others doubt the necessity of hand hygiene and believe that the problem is resolved by wearing gloves. These have proven not be acceptable excuses for not washing hands. For example, the use of alcohol-based gels is faster than water and soap and is gentler on skin. Gels do a much greater job killing bacteria.

There really is no excuse for dirty hands. The next time you go and see your doctor, ask that he or she clean their hands before treating you. That is a good way of protecting yourself from further possible infection.

Vives explained how women still make less than men in the same positions, and also talked about how women are viewed as having specific roles such as nursing positions and secretary positions.

"When you go to the grocery store, a loaf of bread costs one dollar for a woman and a loaf of bread costs a dollar for a man," Vives said.

So, why do men still make more then women?

Using Wal-Mart as an example, Olga stated that two thirds of the employees at Wal-Mart are women, and only one third hold supervisor positions.

"We are the majority of the population and must speak out," Vives continued.

Many women don't see the problem. They don't know inequity is still going on.

"You don't get anything by negotiation; you have to demand it," said Shelia Gainer, a member of the



labor movement.

Her union represents more than 450,000 active members comprised largely of immigrant, African American, Latina and Asian-American workers.

"We are at the bottom: have we gone backwards, when will we learn I can make decisions as well as my husband?" said Kathleen Morkert, a representative from Maya Works.

Maya Works markets the work of artisans who have no outlet for their handiwork. Maya Works organization believes that community development happens through the economic development of women.

At the end of this empowering conference, Vives asked, "Will it take 50 years to make the same as a man? We've come a long way but don't call me 'baby'."

Gone But Not Forgotten

The historical funeral home that laid to rest some famous Chicagoans including Olympic sprinter Jessie Owens and Nation of Islam leader Elijah Muhammad will be closing its doors this New Years Eve. The Griffin funeral home located at 32nd and King Drive is closing its final

casket. "I'm glad to retire, to a certain extent but yet I'll miss it," CEO Alvce C. Griffin stated.

The Griffin Funeral home has been open more than 50 years. It opened up in 1947 originally located on 3215 S.Michigan, but then was later located to 3232 S.King Dr. This didn't come easy when Ernest Griffin, founder and husband of Alyce Griffin, began his journey to buy this small amount of space he couldn't get a loan from any of the banks. In fact he had to go through 32 banks before finally

Independence Bank agreed to help.

In 1990 an anonymous man with a van painted with a confederate flag approached the memorial expecting to see the POW camp where his ancestor died during the civil war, but what he got wasn't what he expected. He never expected to be in a neighborhood that had as many African Americans as it did, he never expected to talk to an African American, but an employee there by the name Jim O'Neal said that all changed after he saw his ancestors name inside on the memorial. It was in ship shape condition as was proud to see it they're being represented the way it was. He left a changed man, a man with a smile on his face.

This business is a very important part of history to the state of Illinois because this site was originally the former Camp Douglass, a civil war camp used to contain confederate prisoners captured during the war, according to The Sun times. More than 5,000 Confederates died from camp diseases that are of an unknown cause and they are memorialized on a Heritage Memorial Wall outside the funeral home. The Griffins spent 60 years building up the well-known funeral home "and after taking care of families for 60 years its time to take care our family," according to Griffin.

Many offers have been made in trying to buy the land but Griffin, who is the CEO, has mixed feelings about it.

"Its something that you labored with, and you watched it grow, you had many experiences with," Griffin said.

And you hand it over with all the events that have happened from Jesse Owens funeral to the nation of Islam leader Elijah Muhammad. They have come to the end of the road and they can't let go. It belongs to them and always will.



Why have a ATM or Debit Card?

Many people have a checking account, but why do some of us have an ATM card or debit card as well?

Checking accounts are very common. Checking accounts let a person write checks and transfer money. Sending a check by mail is easy because it is a piece of paper. On the other hand, writing checks at a store register is not as convenient as paying with cash. What if you need a dollar for the vending machine? Vending machines certainly do not accept checks! This is where ATM or debit cards come into play. With an ATM or debit card, you can go over to the ATM and withdraw money. ATM or debit cards are very convenient, but be

careful how many times you use ATM machines. Each time you use your ATM or debit card at any ATM, there MAY be a service charge for using the machine depending on which bank owns the ATM. Do not use the card often or for small amounts. You could pay \$2.50 for taking out \$5.00, that is 50% service charge. Wouldn't that be silly!

Obtaining a checking account and managing or balancing your checking account can be a good way to help prepare yourself to use credit when you are ready. However, BEWARE your debit card transactions will impact your checking account. You must keep your account balanced so that you do not begin to bounce checks or have checks returned for nonsufficient funds. Also, be sure to keep any sensitive information concerning your account, such as your PIN, safe at all times.

A few money smart terms...

Check = a contract agreeing to pay funds to another person or business from funds you have in your account

Checking Account = a bank account from which checks may be written

ATM of Bank Card = a card that is used to withdraw money from your bank account or to obtain a bank statement at an ATM Debit Card = a card that is used to withdraw money from your bank account OR to make purchases using money that is automatically withdrawn from your account

ATM = Automated Teller Machine; this card allows an individual to access their bank statement, withdraw funds or transfer funds using a machine

Balancing a checking account = a system used to make sure that your debits (or money withdrawn) does not exceed your amount credited (or money deposited)

Bounced check or check returned for non-sufficient funds = a check that is returned because there is not enough money in the account to cover the cost of the check



--Tips on becoming a model "The prettiest girl in school doesn't always make the best model," says Ivan Bart, a top agent IMG Models. Aging in city, state there are some things that are required of you before you become a model or even think about modeling.

Second, collect pictures of yourself to create a portfolio. Send your pictures to a local or national modeling agency. It might even help if you attend an opening casting call. You can even take modeling classes if you don't think you're ready to enter the big world of modeling. You can also enter modeling contests and possibly get scouted by local agencies.

Just because you're a model doesn't mean you necessarily get the big bucks. Your pay all depends on your level of experience. A model that has experience can usually get paid anywhere from \$250 to \$1200 an hour for runway work. From cabs, airfare, to the agencies 10% fees and 20% if signed with a local agency is deducted from the models pay, and don't expect any money from the designers, because most of them don't pay. Some models don't even know how much they make, so make sure you pay attention to all of your receipts or get yourself an accountant.

Remember, runway modeling doesn't pay much, but in the future you'll be glad you did it. On the bright side, it's additional experience, and more experience means a higher paycheck. Modeling doesn't always have to confine you to modeling clothes. You can be scouted by editors, photographers, or even a cosmetic company. Cosmetic models usually get paid \$300,000 to \$2 million a year depending on uniqueness and amount of days the model is expected to work.

Last reminder: a model that sells merchandise will move up the modeling ladder to bigger and better stages, runways, cameras, and agencies.
